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Fireplace Reminders for Safe Holiday Gatherings

Tyler, Texas – As chilly evenings return and the thought of a crackling fireplace or woodstove warms the mood, keep safety in mind when starting that first fire. The Hearth, Patio & Barbecue Association has important safety tips for consumers:

- Make sure the fireplace damper is open.
- Make sure chimneys and vents are clear of creosote build-up or obstructions.
- Clean out ashes from previous wood fires.
- Don't build too big a wood fire.
- Use a fire screen or glass door in front of the fire to prevent room sparks.
- Make sure the area around the fireplace or woodstove is clear of furniture, books, newspapers and other potentially flammable materials like fall and holiday decorations.
- Test smoke detector batteries to ensure proper operation.
- Burn only dry, well-seasoned split logs or manufactured logs. Mix soft woods with hard woods for long-glowing ember beds.
- For gas fireplaces, clean the fan and related air-circulation passages and make sure vents are unobstructed.
- Never burn garbage, charcoal or plastic in the fireplace. Do not burn chemically treated, painted or stained wood from construction sites or driftwood found on the beach
- Never use gasoline or any liquid accelerant to help start a fire.
- Keep small children and pets away from the fireplace.
- Never leave a fire unattended, and make certain it is completely extinguished before going to bed.
- If building a wood fire, keep the fire proportionate to the fireplace size.
- Don't close the damper until the embers have completely stopped burning.
- Always follow your state and local burning regulations and programs.
